**TEA TOWEL FUTURES** In fashion they refer to the Lipstick Index to gauge the economic climate: lipstick sales tend to go up in a recession as women treat themselves to a relatively cheap luxury. If there is a homeware equivalent it is the tea towel. Over the past few years this humble kitchen linen has been the focus of designers using the medium as an affordable canvas for their artwork. The ones here feature images of foxes, fish and deer by the wood engraver Andrew Davidson, printed on Scottish linen by the wallpaper and textiles company Lewis & Wood. SHOW STOPPER The ceramics designer Kathleen Hills is known for her white tableware items featuring sections of traditional prints. This is one of her new pieces, a vintage decanter that has been given a modern ceramic stopper. The idea is simple, the effect charming. PLENTY OF PLUCK Here's one of those things that one absolutely does not need, but might just get a thrill of satisfaction by owning: a Christmas tree made of feathers. Just because it's gorgeous. It costs £16 from Anthropologie (00800-0206 8476; anthropologie.eu).

MADE IN BRITAIN The new All Star wallpaper by Barneby Gates features constellations whose metallic stars are given a slightly corroded finish. It creates the effect of movement as the celestial bodies leave trails of stardust in their wake. As with all of the company's papers, it is printed in the Midlands.
