"We now work in an era where the artist cannot be removed from the work," says artist Alan Gutlerrez. For "Call Time: 7pm," Gutlerrez invited three other artists—Jillian Mayer, David Rohn and Antonia Wright—to be photographed with him by Neox Image Photography Studio for publication in Cultured. "Image is basically branding. And like most careers, even in casual social situations, there is an awareness of image and how that will work for or against you, given the context," says Gutierrez.



THE BIG PICTURE

Moore's tables, wall hangings and lights are economical in form yet generous in their surface qualities, a choice that matches the geometric forms with the characteristics of the materials. "It's always easier to separate and categorize things, but it's also less interesting," says Gallery Diet's founder Nina Johnson-Milewski about exhibiting a designer at the gallery for the first time. 


POP-UP ART



When did you know you'd be moving into the family business? I had just graduated from college and we bought a piece of real estate, our current location, as an investment. We were in the construction industry and made a vertical move to the stone industry.

Opustone is known for innovative surface materials, what are some emerging trends? Stone is becoming more like fashion. We are doing different surfaces, patterns and specials finishes. We have materials mimicking leopard print, zebra print, floral print—even crocodile skin. We signed an agreement with a company close to Milan that produces tiles made of moss, seen above, an application that can be blended with real stone. Stone is becoming very trendy but unlike clothing, it stays on trend for a number of years.

What's the wildest request you've gotten from a client? We recently outfitted a customer's yacht and supplied the surfaces for a very luxe bar top. We also have clients do feature walls in their homes made entirely of quartz.

With the success of the Miami and Jacksonville location, do you foresee expansion beyond Florida? We are in the process of opening a fourth location in Fort Lauderdale and I think there is still space for expansion in Florida. However, we absolutely intend on expanding out of state... eventually. opustone.com


